Why do we take part in Remembrance day?

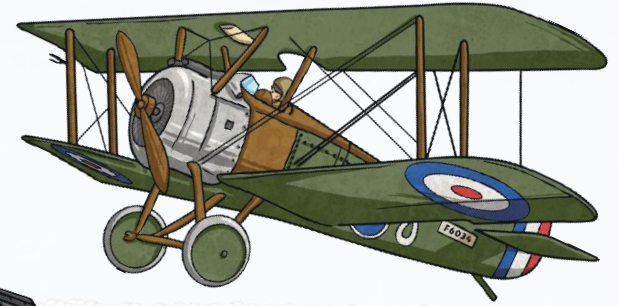
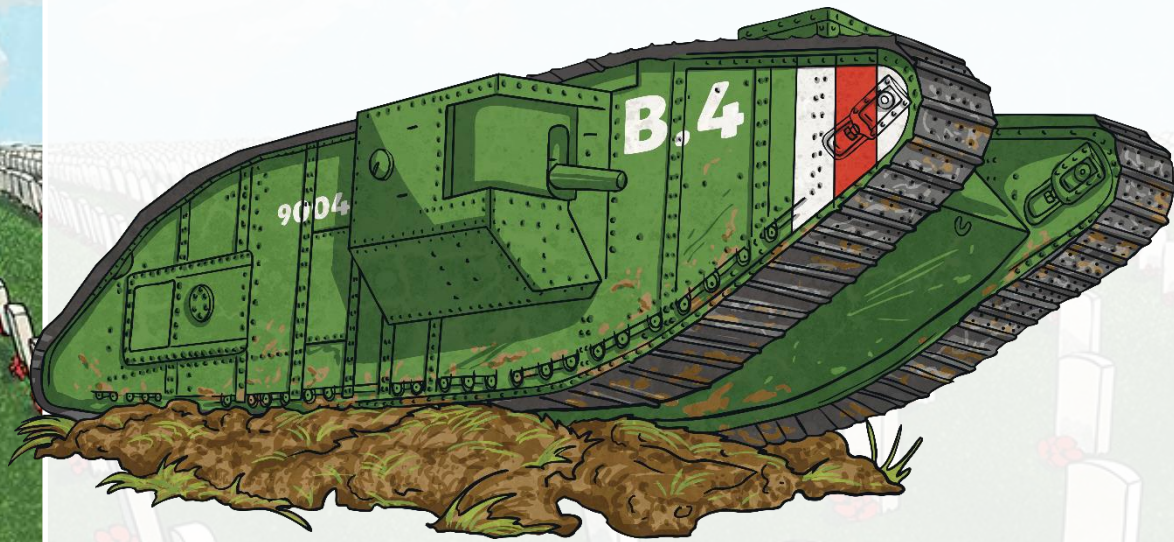

A two-minute silence is always held at 11 a.m. to remember the millions who have died at war.

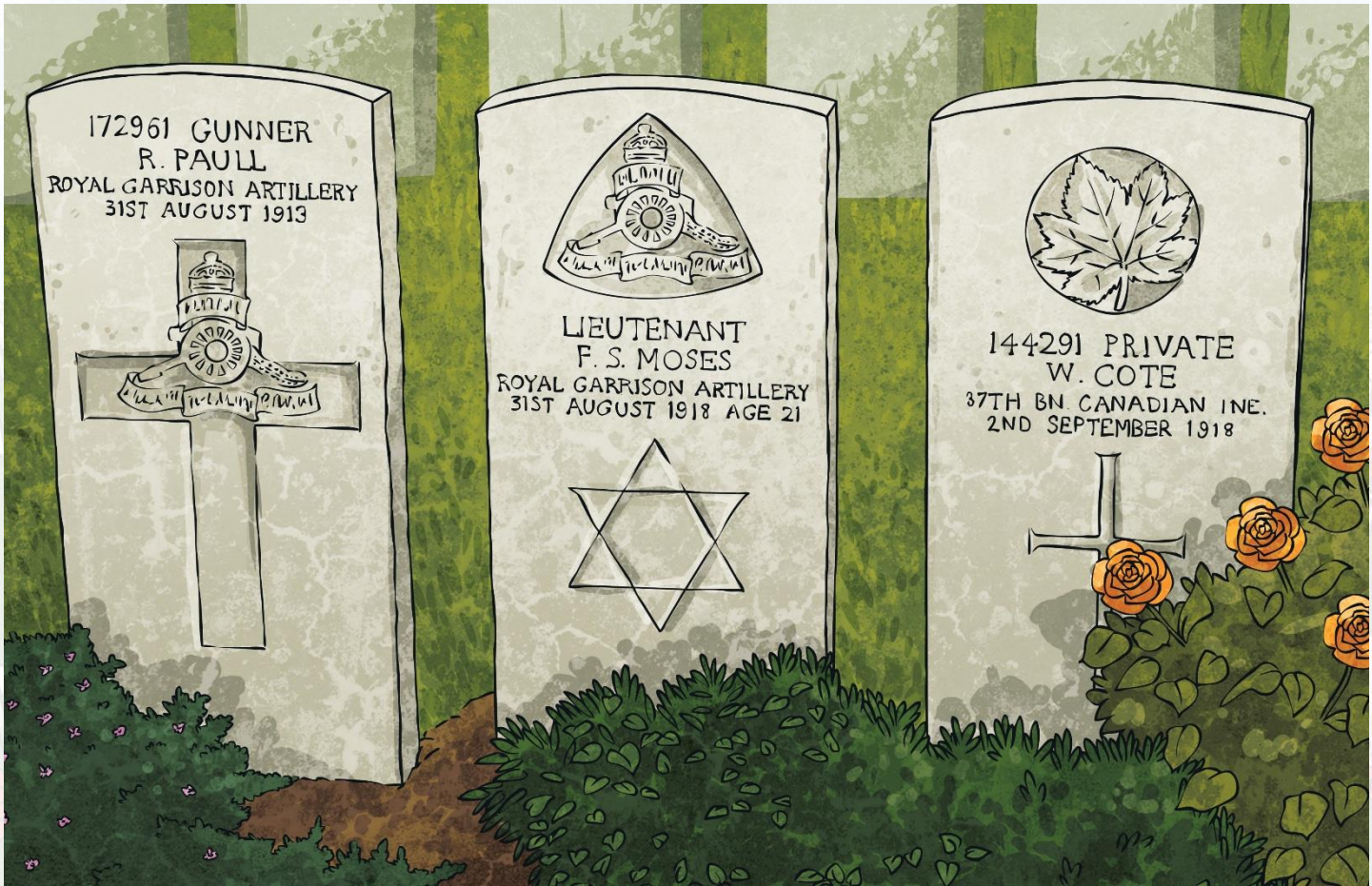


Remembrance Day was first held in 1919, one year after the First World War ended.

On Remembrance Day, people will lay wreaths of poppies on statues and monuments to remember all the soldiers who died for us.
