


October is Black History

His mother was **Puerto** Rican and **father** was **Haitian**.














He was only four when he started drawing, eager to show the world what a great artist he could be.















Jean-Michel liked to go to Manhattan with his mom to visit its wonderful museums.
















One day, when he was seven, Jean-Michel was hit by a car while playing in the street.





















Skulls, teeth, guts, skins, skeletons...


































Things turned upside down when his mother got ill.

In his studio, Jean-Michel spent hours on the floor, mixing pencil, oil sticks, and crayons
















with cut-up quotes he found in comics and history books.


















Jean-Michel believed that everyone deserves a place in art.


























If there was **someone** he **wanted** to **meet**, it was famous **Andy** Warhol, one of his idols.




























Jean-Michel and Andy spent lots of time together: working, painting, and going to parties.


















In less than ten years, Jean-Michel made thousands of paintings and drawings.




























And by painting life in his own unique way, Jean-Michel became one of the most important artists of the 20th century.
































When life got tricky for Jean-Michel, did he give up on what made him happy?
